Activities:

Direct Quotes -need at least 3	Effort - What did they do to achieve/fight for civil rights?
Inspired By Others - What events or what individuals inspired your leader to act?	Empathy - Look internally/globally. How did people react to their efforts? Was anyone else inspired by them?
Passionate About - What is your leader fighting for?	Challenges - What challenges did they face throughout their life? Look at their childhood.
Obstacles - What obstacles were faced by your leader as they fought for rights?	Stands For and Believes In - What are they looking to achieve as they fight for civil rights?
Life Events - What events are they known for or what big events did they participate in?	Results - What were the results of their efforts?
