

## Civil Rights Leader Speech

As well as creating a one-pager, you will select a speech given by your chosen Civil Rights leader. It will be your responsibility to analyze/annotate the speech. You will need to do the following:

- Select a speech given by your Civil Rights leader. It should be 1-2 pages long. If longer, that's fine.
- Will need to print the speech to annotate it. Follow the 'Marking the Text' bookmark to earn full credit for your annotations.

In a one-page paper, double spaced, you will need to answer/address the following:

- Who delivered the speech and when was it made?
- What is the historical context of this speech? What is the background or reason for it?
- What is the speaker's central message?
- How does the speaker convey information to make a point?
- What is the tone of the speech?
- Is the speaker advocating for a certain action?
- Why is this speech important? Why was it important to the people who heard it, and why is it important now?

This needs to be printed and should be glued to the **BACK** of your one-pager. You will also need to submit your speech through Canvas to have it checked for plagiarism.

This is worth 100 points.

The one-pager **AND** speech analysis will be due at the **BEGINNING** of the period on Wednesday, May 1<sup>st</sup>. **NO LATE ONE-PAGERS OR SPEECH ANALYSIS WILL BE ACCEPTED!** Your one-page analysis will need to be submitted to Canvas by 3:30pm on Wednesday, May 1<sup>st</sup>. You will have today, tomorrow, Monday and Tuesday to work on this in class. Make sure you use your class time **WISELY**.

We will begin presentations on Wednesday, the 1<sup>st</sup>. They should go through the end of the week. You're not being here to present will earn you an automatic zero.
